


GBCH – An Integrated Model - Overview


Golden Bay population by SA2 (2018)



Population who identify as having Māori descent


Proportion of total population of Māori descent, 2018

- Single PMS view across all integrated teams
- My Indici Portal is well utilised
- Phone triage 'CALL BACK' service is available via UC
- We have streamlined the prescription service
- Our phone calls are managed away from the reception

NZ Rural Health Strategy -Equity for Rural Whanau

Priorities for the Rural Health Strategy:

- Considering rural communities as a priority group making sure the diverse needs of rural communities are considered in policy, planning and service decisions.
- Prevention: Paving the path to a healthier future Shifting focus to prevention and addressing wider influences on health.
- Services are available closer to home for rural communities shifting the balance towards more services being closer to home, through local provision, or services coming to the community through mobile or digital options.
- Rural communities are supported to access services at a distance better support for when whānau do need to access care outside their community.
- A valued and flexible rural health workforce —growing and supporting the rural health workforce and expanding their capabilities to deliver the care needed by the community closer to home.






Equity in a Rural Context

- What are we doing:
 - Telemedicine specialists' clinics
 - Outreach clinics in Collingwood
 - Specialist infusions for oncology and rheumatology pts
 - Enhanced Services closer to home e.g. Pacemaker checks
 - Visiting specialist clinics i.e. Geriatrician/Medical Specialists, Palliative care
 - Future Concept for funded GP follow ups for Breast and Melanoma rather than our whanau making the 4-hour trip for a 15 min check
 - Urgent Care services GP/NP 1:6 On Call roster
 - Youth Health Services
 - Pain Service


